# James F. Gallant:

(From the Danvers Herald) Wednesday, October 16, 2002

James Francis Gallant Jr., 97, of Danvers died Oct. 14 at the Hunt Nursing and Retirement Home. He was the husband of the late Winifred D. (Hannon) Gallant.

Born and raised in Worcester, Mr. Gallant was the son of the late James F. and Estella L. (Bond) Gallant.

He was educated in the Worcester school system and was a graduate of Worcester North High School, Class of 1923. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Connecticut in 1927 and his Master of Science degree from the University of Massachusetts in 1937. He continued to pursue his profession with advanced studies at Yale University.

Mr. Gallant had been employed at the Essex Agricultural and Technical Institute from 1927 to 1974.

During his tenure as educational manager at Essex Aggie, he initiated many changes, including the vocational guidance program conducted in cooperation with each of the cities and towns in Essex County.

Upon becoming director in 1959, the institute expanded its educational curriculum and embarked on a building program that resulted in modern institutional facilities for the training of young men and women. This started with the Alumni Gymnasium, followed by the McNamara-O'Shea Science Building, the John T. Berry Hall and the enlargement of Maude Hall.

The granting of the associate degree and the development of the one-year Health Occupation programs was achieved under his direction.

At his retirement in 1974, State Sen. William L. Saltonstall presented Mr. Gallant with citations from President Richard Nixon, Sen. Edward Kennedy, the governor of Massachusetts, as well as the members of the Massachusetts State and House of Representatives.

Due to his achievement during his 45 years at the Essex Agricultural and Technical Institute, Gallant Hall was dedicated in his honor on April 12, 1978.

Mr. Gallant served as a member of the Danvers Housing Authority for 25 years and opted not to seek reelection at the age of 87.

During his 20 years as an elected member of the Danvers Housing Authority, the town saw the emergence of Hawkes Manor, Maple/Charter Street, Tapley Manor, Highland Manor, Rand Circle and units on Poplar and Collins streets. He was instrumental in developing 180 elderly units, 52 two, three and four bedroom family units, as well as two houses for the handicapped.

Tapley Manor was dedicated in his honor in 1991 and his portrait hangs in the residence's community area.

Mr. Gallant was a communicant of St. Richard Church and served on several civic and fraternal organizations. He was a member of the Thomas E. Power Council, Knights of Columbus, where he was a past Grand Knight and former state district deputy. He was also a past member of the Danvers Council on Aging.

He is survived by two daughters, Barbara Talbot of Chocorua, N.H., and Winifred Gagnon of Raymond, Maine, and Kissimmee, Fla.; nine grandchildren; 16 great-grandchildren; one great-great-grandchild; four sisters, Mary Russell of Connecticut, Winifred Wickes of Indiana, Josephine Sullivan of Winchester and Marist Sister Mary Anthony of Waltham; and his dear friend, Clare Hayes of Danvers.

He was also the father of the late Jean Marie and brother of the late Edward B. Gallant, U.S. Air Force, B.G., of California.

#### **Riley Heath – Fruit Science Teacher**

Riley Heath, 51, of Lee Hook Road, died Nov. 17, 2002 at Anna Jacques Hospital in Newburyport, after a period of failing health.

Born July 11, 1951 in West Stewartstown, NH, he was the son of the late Rodney and Marcele (Riley) Heath. He was raised in Stewartstown and was a 1969 graduate of Colebrook Academy.

He was very active with Future Farmers of America. He served as State President in his senior year, was a National Delegate, Parliamentarian, State Chapter Secretary and was involved with Interscholastic Judging for grades 10 thru 12.

Riley received a masters degree in Occupational Education from the University of New Hampshire in 1982. He was an active member of Alpha Gamma Rho while he attended UNH.

He was a vocational agriculture teacher at Penn Hills High School, Penn Hills, Pa., and at Essex Agricultural & Technical Institute he taught fruit science and ran the school fruit stand.

For the last ten years he was foreman at RC Hetnar Orchards in Epping.

Riley enjoyed fishing and working his farm.

He is survived by his wife of 12 years, Barbara (Schanda) Heath of Lee; his daughter, Colleen Martha Heath of Lee; three brothers, William Heath of Stewartstown, NH, Rocky Heath of Red Hook, NY, and Lawrence Andrews of Columbia, NH; one sister, Donna Caron of Stewartstown; 2 nieces, 2 nephews, aunts & uncles.

# TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM ADDS INNOVATIVE TOOLS FOR STUDENTS

Students using the school's state of the art "Infolab", have yet another high tech tool at their disposal for specialized software applications. Environmental Science (ES) students are producing high quality 3D color contour maps with the new wide format printer/plotter that was recently installed . The HP DesignJet 500 PS is an impressive peripheral that uses both roll and sheet paper producing GIS maps, landscape design plans and digital photographs up to 42" wide.



The Infolab, a high tech "smart room", is located in the Science Building. Widely used by most classes at the school, It features 21 networked PC's with high speed internet access, data and video projection, "smart board" technology, laser and ink jet

printing, as well as satellite downlink projection.

The fall 2002 semester also gives the academic classes in Gallant Hall a new wireless mobile laptop lab that can enable students in the classroom to access the internet and the campus network.



AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT A four-year course of class and project instruction in the various fields of agriculture, together with related and general education. Tuition free for Essex County students. 2. HOMEMAKING DEPARTMENT Offering a three-year course in the essentials of homemaking, together with related and academic instruction. Also an intensive one-year all-vocational course, open to high school graduates. Free tuition. 3. EXTENSION SERVICE DEPARTMENT In this department assistance is rendered groups and individuals in the problems of the farm, the home, and 4-H Club work. 4. EVENING PRACTICAL ARTS DEPARTMENT Organized class instruction for adults in homemaking subjects. SPECIAL SHORT UNIT COURSES IN POULTRY, GARDENING, SOILS, DAIRYING, Etc. Are given from time to time.
