


Essex Aggie Alumni Association Scholarship Program






News From The Classes:

Bradford Silsby Class of 1963



Bradford Silsby, 64, of Bradford, went home to be with the Lord after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage Saturday, Sept. 20, 2008 at Brigham and Women's Hospital, Boston.

He was born in Haverhill June 3, 1944, son of the late Bradford and Lillian (Waldron) Silsby.

Educated in the Haverhill school system, Mr. Silsby graduated from Haverhill High School and attended Essex Agricultural School. For most of his life he operated the family farm, Silsby Farm, Bradford, and was also an over the road truck driver for 15 years.

Winslow Gray Johnson (Staff)

Winslow Gray Johnson, 84, of Hampton Falls, formerly of Peabody, died Friday, June 27, 2008 at the Exeter Hospital.

He was born April 20, 1924 in Stoneham, the son of the late Harold W. and Hazel M. (Gray) Johnson. He was a graduate of Wakefield High School, the University of Massachusetts at Amherst and received his master's degree in education from the University of New Hampshire. He went on to attend Rittners School of Floral Design in Boston. He was a veteran of World War II serving with the U.S. Army.

Mr. Johnson was an educator at Essex Agricultural Institute in Danvers. He was a long time floriculture instructor in the college division.

After his retirement he worked for Churchill's Garden Center, Northeast Nursery and McLay's Garden Center.

He loved gardening, bird watching and spending time in the outdoors. Mr. Johnson lived in Peabody for 40 years before moving to Hampton Falls in 1997.

Where Does The Money Go?

Our readers may sometimes wonder where all that money goes when they send in their donations for membership dues, the general fund and the scholarship fund.

The Endicott Pear Tree

Planted by the first governor of Massachusetts, John Endicott, it is very unlikely that any other cultivated fruit tree in North America is as old. The Endicott Pear Tree is approximately 376 years old!

The tree has survived several hurricanes and a runin with vandals in 1964.

Throughout the long history of the Endicott Pear Tree there were many efforts to save the tree as the land on which it was planted passed through a sucession of different owners.

Essex Aggie entered the picture when in a report in the April 18, 1946 issue of the Danvers Herald reported that "Soil stripping and disinterest was threatening the life of the 316 year old pear tree".

Henry Thurlow and George Meigs, who were Grange members and teachers at the Aggie and Harold Kelly of the Pomology Department all pitched in to help save the tree.

Ralph Minicello who, until his death a few years ago, operated a vegetable stand off Maple Street just beyond the school. He was a fruit foreman at Essex Aggie. Arrangements were made for him to obtain some scions from the tree and he mailed them to The Pinnacle Packing Co. in Oregon so that offspring from the historic tree could be preserved.

Today the tree is secured by a chain-link fence, on an inconspicuous plot of land hidden behind the large Osram Sylvania Company building on Endicott Street in Danvers.



News From The School: Status of the Alumni Center

After it was learned that the Alumni Field House was to be demolished, the alumni board of directors began to look for an alternate location for its on campus headquarters.

When it was learned that the Catherine Larkin Cottage was not currently being used by the school the new possibilities began to come to light. If the Larkin Cottage became available for use by the alumni association a new vision for its use would be created. The Larkin Cottage represents an important period in Essex Aggie history when for many years the Homemaking School was in operation there. The building was dedicated as a memorial to Aggie student Lt. Catherine M. Larkin who was killed in a plane crash in 1945. The name (and function) would change from Catherine Larkin Cottage to Larkin Memorial Alumni Center.

The Larkin Memorial Alumni Center would provide: Alumni Greeting Center - Alumni Office & Meeting Room - Alumni Functions and Reunions - Fund-Raising Activities - Archive Storage & Museum

If funds are needed to support the facility a donor brick sale could be organized. The memorial bricks could be incorporated into an entrance pathway, constructed by Aggie students.

An employment resource program could be developed to benefit both graduating students and alumnus. This on campus location would allow for and encourage a closer relationship between the alumni association and the school staff & students.

The cottage could be preserved and remain as close to the original construction as possible for its historical importance.

The alumni association could apply for National Register of Historic Places recognition.

The building could be used to house an alumni museum where various items from the alumni archives could be preserved and displayed for viewing.
