


That reminds me, we still haven't found Rosie yet. (Rosemary Lessard Class of '56) Does anyone out there know where she is?

Essex Aggie Charts New Path

County changes make upkeep the big question By Thor Jourgensen Daily Evening Item

DANVERS – On July 1, the Essex Agricultural and Technical Institute becomes the state's new "agricultural charter school" but at what costs to future students and the communities that have supported it for years?

Those are the questions local officials asked Friday as they reviewed plans for the "Aggie's" future pending the upcoming abolition of county government.

The voter-approved decision to scrap centuries-old Essex County will divide the school in half with two-thirds of the 1,200-study enrollment shifting to North Shore Community College.

The college plans to organize an agricultural, environmental and food and animal care degree program around the reorganized Aggie. The High School portion of the school will remain in its current location and continue to accept students from the three dozen communities that make up the county.

The death of county government gives Massachusetts the chance to follow the lead of Connecticut and other states and establish statewide agricultural schools with the Aggie taking the lead in this new educational initiative.

"The Aggie is the largest regional vocational education district in the commonwealth," Director Gustave Olson said.

Olson and state college officials insist the decision to split the Aggie will reduce the costs communities like Lynn and Peabody pay to subsidize the school.

The division will make the school a smaller institution and one that is cheaper to run. Its status as a statewide agricultural school with a year-round working farm will allow the Aggie to reduce community subdidies by attracting students from outside the North Shore area.

The Legislature is also reviewing a bill that would halve community assessments in Fiscal Year 2000, which begins July 1. The assessments and state aid combine to cover the school's budget.

As the biggest contributors to the school, Lynn and Lawrence would see the biggest savings. The two communities combined will send 145 students or about one-third of the total enrollment to the high school next year.

But elected officials are worried about what the Aggie's reorganization and other implications of the county's demise mean in the long run to their city and town budgets.

State Rep. John Slattery, D-Peabody, said concerns about how future subsidies for the Aggie will be divided are dwarfed by implications involving the county's unfunded pension liability.

Slattery doesn't want to see Peabody, which has a fiscally-healthy pension system, burdened with debts that remain after the county dissolves. "You could be asking me to put my community \$4 million to \$5 million in debt," Slattery said.

Olson said the Aggie's \$12,000-per-pupil-cost is competitive with other vocational school's expenses – especially for a school that operates year round.

History Of The Institute

August 8, 1913, Trustees purchase Maplewood Farm from Trustees of the House of the Angel Guardian (Nuns of the Archdiocese of Boston) at a price of \$42,500.00.

September 2, 1913, Teachers start school year.

October 1, 1913, Student start school year. 90 pupils first class.

From 1913 to 1916, There were no building expansion projects, however, there were many old structures on the newly acquired property, I.e. sheds, a dairy barn, farm and maintenance buildings and a greenhouse. Some of these structures were demolished, for example old sheds, other buildings were improved, such as the dairy barn and the greenhouse. This work was done by employees in the maintenance department.

From 1916 through mid-fifties, there were two major construction projects, Smith Hall in 1916 and Maude Hall in 1934. During this same period there were ongoing building projects such as the farm shop, horse barn, Larkin Cottage, milk room and the mechanical equipment addition (maintenance shop) all handled by the maintenance employees of the school.

From the mid-fifties through 1978, projects included: McNamara-O'Shea – 1966; Alumni Gymnasium – 1967; John T. Berry – 1968; Agric. Engineering – 1969; Maude Hall Annex – 1971; Gallant Hall – 1978. During this period many small construction projects were initiated and completed.

From 1978 to present, the only major construction project was the Fish Barn -1995 and other small projects.
