

The Abbott Beech Tree

While looking through the Salem News I read an obituary notice of one Albert W. Abbott 88, World War II vet, 2 Purple Hearts, who passed away at the Masconomet Healthcare Center in Topsfield. The first time I met Mr. Abbott was in late spring or early summer of 1987 when he called the Essex Agricultural School and was forwarded to me. His story had been dismissed by others but there was a sincerity in his voice and relief that someone was interested.

Mr. Abbott told me that he wanted to donate a tree to the Aggie but the catch was that it was growing in his back yard and would have to be dug out and transported to the school. He had been growing this tree for some time and he said that it was quite large. At that point I had to see for myself. Fortunately, he lived right here in Danvers, so after school I took a ride to his house to see what we would be dealing with and hear the story. He was right, it was pretty good size, a European Beech, Fagus sylvatica, that he had started from seed several years previously. It looked to be about 15-18 feet tall and with a trunk diameter of 4-5", maybe 6 inches. It also had a few smaller trees of the same species clustered around it. This was going to be a project but a great experience for the kids who would do the work.

He said that he had wanted to donate the tree in previous years but no one would come to look at it. He told me that he wanted it to have a home at the Aggie because his father was the first student to "receive a diploma from the Aggie". It seemed a little far-fetched but the numbers began to work and I could believe it. If you take a look at the Alumni class rosters, for 1916, you will see, William J. Abbott at the

top of the list and I am sure they awarded the diplomas alphabetically so he was most likely correct, his father was the first to receive a diploma from Essex Aggie.

So now I had to figure out how I would make the move. First, would be approval from my Dept. Head and Principal, then securing vehicles and adult personnel to assist, and then getting the kids on board and excited.

The tree had been growing in its location for several years, so we needed to cut a few roots and force it to produce new growth close in to its trunk. Now, so that the kids felt ownership, I kept the work specifically for one group. This group would be the horticulture students who would graduate in 1989. Most of the work would be done when they were Juniors during the school year 1987/88.

First thing in the fall, we went to the location and "root pruned" the tree. We mulched the tree heavily and soaked the soil with water, adding peat moss to keep moisture close by during the winter. We had calculated that we would need to create a root ball about 5 feet in diameter to bring enough roots along to keep it going.

We returned in the spring to dig the tree. The students, tools and supplies were all transported in a school van and it took two 3 hour class periods to "ball and burlap" the tree. A hole was dug for the tree back at campus using a backhoe.

On the day of the move, we took a van for the students, a dump truck pulling a flat bed equipment trailer and a front end loader.

News From The Classes Joan and Dave Townley '61

Endicott Park Rangers Joan and Dave Townley from the class of '61 have been stewards of the 165-acre park for more than 40 years. They both retired last January and moved to their home in Conway, NH.

The Townleys have not only made the park their home, living in the six-room, upstairs apartment in the carriage house visitor center, they have made the 165-acre park into a place where young people can learn about nature.

Endicott Park attracts nearly 160,000 visitors a year, who can take long walks down the trails, bring children to the playground, go snowshoeing and sledding, or pet the animals in the barn. There are community garden plots and monthly nature programs.

For more than four decades, the Townleys have been live-in stewards of the park on Forest Street, watching over the animals in the barn and maintaining and caring for the grounds and buildings, which include the carriage house and a large hay barn. They raised their three children at the park.

Dave, who has been on the job for 41 years, retired as park director and chief ranger, while Joan is retired as the wildlife biologist and interpreter. In their early years at the park, Joan was raising her children but was also a full-time "volunteer." She worked the family's Christmas tree business for a number of years and became a full-time ranger in 1996. Five rangers oversee the park. As park rangers, they are law enforcement officers and trained EMTs, responding to medical aid calls within the park. They also greet schoolchildren and give educational talks.

The town acquired the property from R.S. Robie Realty Co. and Richard Robie in 1961 for \$330,000. In the late 1950s and early 1960s, Danvers had large truck farms along Route 114. "There were people in town who did not really see the value of buying an old farm," Joan said. Those at the time like Ralph Goodno, who was a member of the Conservation Commission and a teacher at Essex Aggie, and others had the vision that open space would someday be valuable, she said. The purchase spared the park from becoming a 250-home development. The park also

encompasses 11 acres owned by the Danvers Historical Society.

The Townleys, who have been married for 49 years, met at Essex Aggie, where Joan studied animal husbandry and Dave studied forestry, park management and natural resources. He went on to earn a bachelor's degree in forestry and park management from the University of Georgia and a master's degree in outdoor education from the University of New Hampshire.

He taught for 18 years at Essex Aggie, and in 1972 the Townleys were hired to do a master plan for the park. It had pretty much been left alone since the town bought it.

Under the Townleys, Endicott Park became a place dedicated to environmental education, with programs that include monthly nature presentations, crafts and others programs.

"The master plan was to make it an environmental education center," Dave said. "We've been working toward that all these years."

"The wilderness is great, but if you can't get in there, it doesn't mean much to you. So, it was to facilitate bringing the open space and the people together in a comfortable atmosphere," Joan said of their vision for the park.

Dave said he's going to miss "the excitement of the children," while Joan will miss "most of all the people, because they are like a huge family now. We see people here, we see them in the grocery store, and we stop and we chat. We have wonderful volunteers who have come in and just made a huge difference."

Married in 1932, the Bennetts lived in Danvers for a short time, before moving to South Hamilton, where they lived for 62 years. In addition to her family, she enjoyed spending time at the beach, particularly West Beach in Beverly Farms, where many family memories were made. She enjoyed sewing, knitting, making draperies and upholstering furniture, and made braided and hooked rugs.

James A. "Red" CAMERON, Class of 1956

Danvers - James A. "Red" Cameron, 77, passed away on January 6, 2014, in Beverly Hospital. He was the husband of Virginia (Doherty) Cameron, with whom he shared 53 years of marriage.

Born in Somerville on August 9, 1936, he was the son of the late James M. and Nina (Geddes) Cameron. Red was employed with the Essex Agricultural and Technical High School in Hathorne for 37 years, holding various positions. He also was employed with Endicott College for 13 years. Red enjoyed social clubs and was a member of the Elks Lodge in Salem and Beverly, the American Legion in Beverly, the Vittori Rocci Post in Beverly, the Elm Club in Danvers, and the Polish Club in Danvers. He took great pride in his grandchildren. He also enjoyed making flower boxes and bird houses, and loved spending time in his yard.

Gordon P. Begin, Class of 1983



Any excess funds will be donated to the American Heart Association.



The tree was loaded on the trailer, tied down and wrapped for the trip back to campus.

And now in the year 2014, the "Abbott Beech" is still there, located on the main front lawn just to the southeast of the tent that is set up for graduation each year. Fortunately, it is located on the side of the campus not being torn up by the construction of the new school building. Today, this tree has to be close to 35- 40 feet tall, maybe more.

The younger Mr. Abbott never made any mention about wanting a plaque on the tree or any notoriety, so I never put anything on it. But 4 short years after planting it, one of my students who worked to move the tree, died suddenly from a tumor of some type, in his abdomen, I believe. And in the years to follow, several of his classmates when they saw me would say that they wanted to plant a tree and dedicate it to Jason (Hussey) and each one I would tell that there is already a wonderful tree that Jason helped to plant and that they could place a plaque there, but none has arrived

I have told this story to some of the school personnel who continued on after I retired. The story went along with a folder containing information including sales receipts for shrubs and trees planted and their location. I don't know if any remember the story.
