Essex Aggie selects a new superintendent:

After nearly 2 1/2 years of controversy, trials and tribulations, the trustees have selected longtime vocational educator Roger Bourgeois to lead the school in the future.

The trustee's first pick, Ed Bouquillon pulled out during negotiations and the trustees were forced to return for another vote.

Mr. Bourgeois has a 25 year career in vocational and technical education, including 15 years at Shawsheen Technical High School in Billerica.

Mr. Bourgeois will succeed interim superintendent Helen Hegarty, taking over at a time when Essex Aggie is looking ahead to a possible merger with the North Shore Technical High School in Middleton.

When asked about his future relationship with acting principal Gene Demsey, Mr. Bourgeois replied, "We'll make a great team. Agricultural education is his strength so he's got what I don't have and hopefully, I have the administrative background so that as a team we can move the school forward for the students."


Jean (Ouellette) Radford Class of 1954

Deceased Classmates:

Carlton K. Brown Class of 1932

Carlton K. Brown, 94, former tree warden for the town of Rockport, husband of the late Eleanor (Wilson) Brown, of 3 Broadway Ave., Rockport, died on Friday, December 16, 2005, at Den-Mar Rehabilitation and Nursing Center, Rockport.

Born in Rockport on Feb. 7, 1911, he was the son of the late Alvin S. and Caroline (Sears) Brown. Mr. Brown was a graduate of Rockport High School and Essex County Agricultural School.

One of his first jobs was at the age of 14, delivering special delivery letters on his bicycle for the U.S. Postal Service. Following his graduation from Essex Aggie, he worked as a gardener on the Blood Estate in Lynnfield, as well as on the Taylor Estate in Gloucester. He also worked for more than two years at the former Cape Ann Tool Co.

In 1946, Mr. Brown was elected tree warden and was re-elected to that position until 1960. In that year, Mr. Brown was appointed forestry superintendent and served in that capacity until his retirement in 1974. He was also a member of the Rockport Fire Department from 1945 until 1971.

Mr. Brown was very civic-minded and over the years worked on many projects that helped beautify the town that he loved. In 1992, a Resolution of Appreciation was signed by the board of selectmen for his many years of service to the town of Rockport.

In his early retirement years, he and his wife traveled extensively, often to a warmer climate during the winter months. They were both very active square dancers and attended many square dance conventions across the country.

Mr. Brown had a very busy and active life. He was an avid sailor and a longtime member of Sandy Bay Yacht Club. In addition to sailing, Mr. Brown enjoyed taking care of his property, especially his gardens, dancing, reading, and music. During the last decade his dancing took center stage, especially at Gloucester Elks and the Peabody Senior Center. When the music played, it was not uncommon for him to dance every dance.

Mr. Brown was a member of the Ashler Lodge A.F. & A.M., Rockport Conservation Committee, North Shore Horticultural Society, First Congregational Church of Rockport, BPOE Elks Lodge 892, Massachusetts Tree Wardens Association, and the Thacher Island Association.

Gertrude (Lawton) Devaney Class of 1936.

Gertrude Devaney died at the Pleasant Valley Nursing Home in Derry, New Hampshire, Saturday Morning, February 3, 2007. She was 89. She was a graduate of Essex Agricultural School in 1936. She served on the Editorial Staff of the Green and White as the Editor-in-Chief in1935. She is survived by sons, Robert, Joseph, and Stephen ('67)

Paul F. Journeau Class of 1967

Paul F. Journeau, 57, of Haverhill, formerly of Arizona and Lawrence, died Thursday, Jan. 4, 2007 at Lawrence General Hospital after a lengthy illness. Paul was born in Lawrence, son of the late Rene J. and Lillian A. (Tetreau) Journeau.

Gregory H. McClain Class of 1975

Gregory H. McClain, 50, of Exeter died Monday, Feb. 19, 2007, at his home surrounded by his family. He was born Sept. 17, 1956, in Lynn, Mass., a son of Warren and Elaine (Jacobs) McClain of Lynn. Mr. McClain was raise in Lynn and lived there most of his life. He was a graduate of Essex Agricultural High School of Danvers, Mass., and the Wentworth Technical School.

He had lived in Exeter the past nine years. He was an active member of the United Church of Christ of North Hampton, where he served on the board of the Interfaith Hospitality network for the homeless. He was an HVAC and an appliance technician for Sears for many years, before which he was employed as a respiratory therapist at the Lynn-Union Hospital.

He was very proud of his Scottish heritage and had made several trips to visit the castle of his family in Scotland.

He was an avid gardener and he enjoyed making his home brew. He had a wonderful sense of humor and quick wit and would often repair elderly customers' appliances for free.

Deceased Classmates:

Nathan H. Clark (Staff)

Nathan "Nate" H. Clark, 94, died peacefully on Thursday, April 12, 2007, in the Baldwinville Nursing Home with his family by his side.

He was predeceased by his first wife, Eleanor (Marcy) Clark, and his second wife, Myrtle (Fennell) Clark, also a step-son, Keith Mudgett, of Meredith, N.H.,

Mr. Clark leaves six step-children, David Mudgett and his wife Dorothy of Belmont, N.H., Dennis Mudgett and his wife Norma of New Hampton, N.H., Wayne Mudgett and his wife Carol of Meredith N.H., Gail Hewitt of Central Harbor, N.H., Kathy Rossbach and her husband Eben of Leominster, and Nancy Afonso and her husband Albert of Hubbardston. He also leaves 22 grandchildren; 33 great-grandchildren; a sister, Margaret (Kimball) Whipple in Groton, Conn.; and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Clark was born Feb. 27, 1913 in Swampscott. He served in the South Pacific with the Seabees Unit during World War II and returned to his landscaping job for the City of Salem. He then taught Horticulture for close to 30 years at Essex Agricultural and Technical Institute. After his retirement he was a member of the Danvers Senior Citizens, where he especially enjoyed golfing weekly and was honored for volunteering his bookkeeping skills to other seniors. In 2000 he moved from Danvers to an assisted living facility in central Massachusetts to be near his family. There he continued gardening and lawn care, which was his great love throughout his life

Joseph Finocchio Class of 1929

For 50 years in northern Massachusetts, if you were looking for a sign to point you in the right direction, Joseph Finocchio was your guy.

As proprietor of Salem Sign Co., Mr. Finocchio's neon signs lit up businesses throughout the region. Some of his creations included the Howard Johnson pie man, Peanut Man, and the Leaning Tower of Pizza. Now collectors' items, many of the original Salem signs were featured in a special neon exhibit

at the National Heritage Museum in Lexington in 2003. "He was a pillar of the local economic community," said his step-daughter, Kathryn Hughes. "He was a very creative, very innovative man with strong business instincts."

Mr. Finocchio died May 12 at Masconomet Healthcare Center in Topsfield. He was 100. He was born in Catignano, Italy, and came with his family to the United States at the age of 5. He was raised in Danvers and educated in the one-room Putnamville School. After graduating from the Essex Agricultural School in 1929, he attended Wagner School of Sign Arts in Boston. Mr. Finocchio's career began in a cramped rented apartment in Beverly, where he launched a small sign company with a set of brushes and paints.

"He was a resourceful, hands-on kind of guy. He used to stop trucks on the street and ask them if they needed him to paint a sign for them," said his step daughter.

In 1935, he acquired Salem Sign Co. and set up shop on Highland Avenue. The site became recognizable by his handiwork, a huge neon flying witch, said his family. The National Heritage Museum in Lexington labeled his Howard Johnson's pie man a "landmark for hungry Americans"

As Howard Johnson motels and restaurants opened across the Eastern seaboard, his company grew right along with them, his "pie man" leading the way. "Not many businesses survive for 50 years. He always tried to stay ahead of his trade and aggressively pursue his business," said his step daughter. "He really enjoyed being part of the local business community and to help out other local business owners. It was his American Dream. We all aspire to have the kind of life he lived."

At the time of his death Mr. Finocchio was the oldest living alumnus of Essex Agricultural Institute. He was an avid gardener, bowler, and tennis player during his retirement. In his 80s, he participated in the USTA Super Seniors Tournaments at Longwood Tennis Club and the Essex Country Club Tennis Nationals and in other senior citizen tournaments
